



Orange County Gives Tips for Fire Prevention Week

Orange County Emergency Services invited the public to participate in fire Prevention Week from October 4 through 10. This year's theme is, "Hear the Beep Where You Sleep." Orange County Fire Marshal Jason Shepherd encourages all Orange County residents to develop a home fire safety plan and practice it. The following tips serve as a checklist for home smoke alarms.

- Install smoke alarms inside and outside each bedroom and sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- There are two kinds of alarms. Ionization smoke alarms are quicker to warn about flaming fires.
 Photoelectric alarms are quicker to warn about smoldering fires. It is best to use both types of alarms in the home.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

Back To School Safety

Every fall, thousands of children across the Carolinas head back to school. With nearly 15 percent of those children typically walking or biking to their classes, AAA warns drivers to be especially vigilant for pedestrians before and after school hours. The afternoon hours are particularly dangerous – over the last decade, nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. AAA offers six ways to keep kids safe this school year.

1. TALK TO YOUR TEEN.

Car crashes are the leading cause of death for teens in the United States, and more than one in four fatal crashes involving teen drivers occur during the after-school hours of 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. Get evidence-based guidance and tips at **TeenDriving.AAA.com.**

2. COME TO A COMPLETE STOP.

Research shows that more than one third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking carefully for children on side walks and in crosswalks before proceeding.

3. WATCH FOR BICYCLES.

Children on bikes are often inexperienced, and unpredictable. Slow down and allow at least three feet of passing distance between your vehicle and the bicycle. If your child rides a bicycle to school, have them wear a properly-fitted bicycle helmet on every ride.

4. SLOW DOWN.

Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling just 10 mph faster.

5. ELIMINATE DISTRACTIONS.

Children often cross the road unexpectedly and may emerge suddenly between two parked cars. Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing.

6. REVERSE RESPONSIBLY.

Every vehicle has blind spots. Check for children on the sidewalk, driveway and around your vehicle before slowly backing up. Teach your children to never play in, under or around vehicles-even those that are parked.

First and foremost I hope this message reaches everyone in good health and well being; that the church body as a whole is doing well also!

Well I arrived here safe in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba (all thanks be to God). After leaving Naval Station Norfolk this past Friday the weather due to the storm flying in did get a little rough, so we had an overnight layover in Jacksonville, Florida. I arrived here in Cuba the following day. The base is unconnected to the outside of the island; it really feels like I'm in the desert. It's always 90 degrees here nothing below 85 in the day and no lower than 78 at night. I see a lot of iguana (some as big as dogs) and what they call banana rats (but I believe to be raccoons).

I'm really looking forward to Friday visiting the marines out at the fence line with the other chaplain I'm relieving. Then I will have the opportunity to see some of Cuba (maybe even one of the old cars my dad keeps asking me about, lol).

I'm doing well and excited about the ministry I will be a big part of here. My day here will be pretty busy with bible studies; two protestant services on Sunday, teaching a financial peace class, movie and game nights and visiting different work spaces. I will at times visit the detention centers where they keep the detainees (that will be only for the sake of providing service for the medical team there).

All in all, I'm grateful to have gotten this opportunity in my military career, and even more grateful for having my family and church support. I ask that you all keep me in your thoughts and prayers not only for my safety, but also that I will be obedient and open to this task that the US Navy has entrusted me with and that God Himself has called me too.
